However, this road has heavy traffic and we cannot put the lives of our kids to risk for education. Even if the centre is across the road, we have to pick and drop them, but since they are very young, they have to be kept under watch, but we cannot keep an eye on them from across the street."

The parents (the vendors selling soft toys on the street) have cleaned a spot just beneath the street light so that their kids can study there. When Lokmat Times went to have a chat with the kids, the children studied in the dark, mostly completing their home work for the day. Kishan, a student of kindergarten, when asked what he aims to become, without a hesitation said that he wants to become a soldier and guard the borders of the nation. He even asked his mother to buy a uniform for him as a Diwali gift and eventually his mother Santosh, got one for him. Prem, a fifth standard student immediately responded that since.
